Overview

The core layer comprises a combination of two FortiSwitch units and up to four FortiGate devices. A core switch is a high-capacity, high-performance Layer 3 switch positioned at the physical backbone of an enterprise network. Engineered to aggregate massive volumes of data from distribution switches, it provides ultra-low latency and maximum throughput to ensure uninterrupted routing and packet. A core switch in networking serves as the high-capacity backbone, italic centralizing data flow and ensuring efficient communication between different network segments. Simply put, it's the kingpin that keeps your network humming. It's responsible for accurately routing communication among layers and departments of different sections. In large organizations, networks become complex, exchanging massive amounts of data.
