

How to use a fiber optic connector heat shrink tubing machine

To use a fiber optic connector heat shrink tubing machine, carefully position the splice sleeve, set the appropriate temperature and cycle time, and activate the heating process to achieve a secure, uniform shrink without damaging the fiber.

Step-by-Step Guide

1. Prepare the Fiber and Splice Sleeve Before using the heat shrink machine, ensure the fiber is properly stripped, cleaned, and spliced. Slide the heat shrink tubing or splice protector onto the fiber, making sure it covers the splice completely . Avoid bending or stressing the fiber beyond its minimum bend radius to prevent damage .
2. Select the Correct Machine Settings

- Older machines (e.g., Tritec HSOII, Fujikura 62S) typically require lower temperatures ($\sim 125^{\circ}\text{C}$) and longer heating times (~ 60 seconds) for standard splice sleeves .
 - Modern machines (e.g., Fujikura 70S) use higher temperatures (up to 240°C) and shorter cycles (10–25 seconds depending on sleeve type) with automatic dual heater clamping plates .
 - Always check the manufacturer's pre-set options for the specific splice sleeve being used and adjust if necessary.
3. Position the Sleeve in the Machine Place the splice sleeve or tubing in the heating chamber or clamping plate. Ensure it is centered and aligned properly to achieve uniform shrink. Some machines, like the Haloblaze Osprey, can be combined with a heat gun for consistent results without rotating the...
