

Installation of cold aisle in computer room

Installing a cold aisle involves arranging server racks face-to-face, enclosing the aisle with containment structures, and directing cool air efficiently to server intakes.

Step 1: Plan the Layout

Begin by arranging your server racks in alternating rows of hot and cold aisles. The fronts of the racks should face each other, forming the cold aisle, while the backs face the hot aisle where heated air is expelled (). Measure aisle width, ceiling height, and available space to ensure proper airflow and containment installation ().

Step 2: Implement Containment Structures

Cold aisle containment (CAC) requires physical barriers to prevent mixing of cold and hot air. This typically includes:

- Ceilings or roofs over the cold aisle
 - Doors at each end of the aisle
 - Gap in-fill panels along the sides of racks
 - Optional tempered glass panels on top of cabinets to seal the aisle from the ceiling ()
- These structures ensure that cold air from the cooling units is directed straight into the server intakes, improving cooling efficiency and reducing energy consumption ().
